The SCC Aeronautics Program, which appeared at this weekend's Nut Tree Air Fair, was also featured at the Board of Trustees meeting Oct. 5, highlighting the opportunities available for students interested in the field. The program includes practical and theoretical knowledge in basic maintenance techniques, plus the special requirements of either airframe or powerplant work. Upon satisfactory completion of the required courses, the student is eligible to take the Federal Aviation Administration written, oral and practical examination for airframe or powerplant license.

Located at the Nut Tree Airport, the program covers a variety of specialized topics focused on some basic areas of mathematics and science, and many more technical areas including electricity, hydraulics and FAA regulations. Upon completion of the Aeronautics program curriculum and licensing, students work for companies such as United Airlines, Scaled Composites, Rolls Royce, Delta Airlines, and BART, among many others.

Helicopter on Campus

The Calstar Air Ambulance landed on campus Oct. 11 to provide training to the Solano EMT, EMR, Nursing and Criminal Justice students. According to EMT faculty member John Zimmerman, the training was designed to show students how law enforcement, the fire department and the Air Ambulance work together to provide emergency care for critically injured patients or to facilitate a rescue. Students also learned about the job requirements to

become a Flight Medic or Registered Nurse. The presentation explained the different hospitals that patients are taken to depending on the nature of their illness, or the mechanism of injury, as well as the amount of time it takes by air versus by ground ambulance, Zimmerman said. Participants were reminded never to approach the aircraft until cleared by the pilot, who then radios the Fire Department Incident Commander.
