Groundbreaking for Library Building





College officials broke ground last week on the new Library and Learning Resource Center.

Opened in 1971, the venerable Building 100 will soon be replaced by a nearly 60,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art library building that is expected to be ready in time for the fall 2021 school term.

The new library facility will be built in an open green space just west of the Building 1400 Student Center and just south of the Theater Arts building.

When the new library is finished, the current library will be demolished and an open area will be constructed in its place – essentially swapping the two parcels on the Rockville campus.

The construction of the new library will necessitate the removal of some trees that exist in the green space currently but those trees won't be going to waste, officials said.

Lumber from many of the trees will be repurposed for some construction features and benches in the new library. The building is also projected to use 15 percent less energy, officials said.

Librarian Ruth Fuller said “In one way or another, we have been working toward this my entire 18 years of being at Solano,” Fuller said. “We’re finally doing this.”

Fuller said she and the library staff are excited for the construction of the new library and look forward to the 2021 completion date.

“The great thing about it is it's a community resource,” Fuller said. “If you come in looking for help with something, we don't ask you if you're a student. These resources are available to you.”

Detour for Library Construction



SCC Alumnus and Acclaimed Author Dies

Novelist Ernest J. Gaines, acclaimed author of "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman," and other novels about the struggles of African Americans in rural Louisiana, died from natural causes at his home in Oscar, La., November 5 at the age of 86.

Gaines graduated from Vallejo Junior College – now, of course, Solano Community College – in 1953 before serving in the Army and entering San Francisco State University.

The son of sharecroppers, Gaines was born on a plantation in Pointe Coupee Parish, near Baton Rouge. He attended school for little more than five months out of the year. But that was more education than his family before him had received. He would say later in life that his ear for the stories of his elders was developed as he wrote letters for adults who couldn't read or write.

In the late 1940's, at the age of 15, his family moved to the northern California city of Vallejo, about 30 miles north of San Francisco. He told interviewer Lawrence Bridges that in California he could do something that had been forbidden in the South: visit a library.

In 1993, Gaines received a MacArthur Foundation "genius grant." The same year saw the publication of his most critically acclaimed novel to date, "A Lesson Before Dying," which describes the belated education of a young man wrongly sentenced to death. The work received the National Book Critics Circle Award for Fiction, and a 1999 television adaptation won an Emmy Award as Best Film for Television.

Athletics News



Men's Basketball: Sophomore **Jordan Adams** paced the offense as the Falcons downed Cañada, 97-77, in the opening round of the Skyline Open on Friday evening. Adams shot 7-of-9 from three-point range, tallying 26 total points. Sophomore **Dunnell Stafford** backed him up with 21 points and a double-double. Overall the Falcons hit 14 threes, leading Cañada by as many as 32 points in the second half.

Women's Basketball: Freshman **Ashmeen Sran** scored a game-high 26 points to lead the Falcons to a dominating win over Grossmont in the teams' final game of the Riverside Earn Our Stripes Tournament on Saturday morning. Sran shot nearly 63 percent from the field and over 50 percent from beyond the arc, connecting six total times. Sophomore **Vanessa Hughes** added 12 points, while freshman **Lexi Derf** tallied 11 to round out the scorers in double figures. The Falcons jumped out to an early lead, outscoring the Griffins 30-11 in opening quarter. Solano tacked on 10 points in the second quarter to extend the margin and outscored Grossmont each quarter. Solano (2-4) heads to Siskiyou next on Tuesday, Nov. 19 for a single-game matchup at 5 p.m.

Soccer: The Solano women's soccer team won its fourth straight match with a 2-1 victory over Merritt on Friday afternoon. After a first half goal by Merritt, freshman **Jordyn Bennett** scored in the 56th minute off of a feed from sophomore **Grace Lee**. Freshman **Keana Flynn** scored her 14th goal on the season, 11th in Bay Valley Conference play, and the go-ahead score in the 80th minute off an assist by freshman **Amber Ayala**. Reigning Solano Athletics October Athlete of the month, sophomore **Kirstyn Gotschall** played the entire match in the goal. The Falcons (12-5-3, 11-1-1) close out the regular season on Friday, Nov. 15, hosting

Napa Valley in a in a makeup match at 3 p.m.
