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Foundation Awards 99 Student Scholarships











The SCC Scholarship Foundation had a great turnout at last week's Scholarship Reception.

The Foundation provided 99 scholarship awards to 48 students in the total amount of \$42,275.

The SCCEF provided 42 scholarship awards to 36 students in the total amount of \$33,800.

The Math and Science Dept. NSF Stem program provided 26 awards to 26 students in the amount of \$76,075.

Total amount of all awards is \$137,075.

Board members Jay Yerkes and Thomas Trujillo attended the event and other board members, John Zeltin and Andrea Garcia reviewed a large amount of the scholarship applications from the SCCEF Board.

Fragile Worlds, Undiscovered Worlds

Solano Community College will host the first in a series of gallery exhibitions focused on the present status and future of our planet. <u>"Fragile Worlds, Undiscovered</u> <u>Worlds"</u> asked students to focus on our planet's fragility and seemingly endless string of crises as it stands in contrast with the relative stability, promise, and mystery of space.

An opening reception will be held at 4 p.m.

on Oct. 18 at the Herger Gallery; the show runs October 18 - November 8 and is open to the public. Light refreshments will be served. Displayed work ranges from digital art and animation focused on outer space and the potential for life outside of Earth, to a wall-sized collaborative interpretation of Van Gogh's Starry Night, to an interactive sculptural exhibit focused on the use and expression of space.

As we discussed themes for this show, we considered the Amazon rainforest fires, the rapid melting of the polar ice caps, and constant cultural and political strife, among so many other issues that plague our thoughts. How do we confront these events that feel so out of control? Often, we don't — our responses to these disturbing realities range from distraction to despair.



The black hole becomes something the modern sensibility longs for — the absolute certainty of nothingness. We asked our students to create art that represents our planet, the possibilities of space and other forms of life, or their reactions to the current state of the world.

A portion of this exhibit is dedicated to Julianna Atkins-Young, a former student of Solano College Arts who ended her life during the summer. During her time at Solano College, Atkins-Young completed coursework in photography, painting, printmaking, digital arts, and more. Solano College Arts invites the public to bring a photograph or memory from a loved one to place on an *ofrenda*, an altar paying respect to and celebrating those who have passed.

There's a New Sheriff in Town

Lieutenant Craig Collins is taking over where Lt. travis left off.

Lt. Collins started his career with the Solano County Sheriff's Office in August, 2002. As a Deputy-Sheriff, he was assigned to Court Security, Patrol, and Coroner's Office. During these assignments Craig worked other collateral duties including Field Training Officer, K-9 Handler, and S.W.A.T. team operator. He also provided agency training as a Defensive Tactics Instructor and Tactical Rifle Instructor.

Craig was promoted to Sergeant-Sheriff in December, 2015. As a Sergeant, he was a supervisor for Patrol and the



Sheriff's Enforcement Team (SET) . In addition to his regular assignments he also supervised the K-9 Unit, the Defensive Tactics Team, as well as being named S.W.A.T. team leader. In 2016, Craig co-created a tactical entry program codifying search and entry techniques for the Sheriff's Office. In 2018, Craig received the Sheriff's Office Medal of Valor for his actions in the line of duty.

In June, 2019 Craig Collins was promoted to Lieutenant-Sheriff. He was assigned to the Compliance and Professional Standards Bureau for several months. Craig is currently attending the Sherman Block Supervisory Leadership Institute (SLI) Class 433. He holds numerous professional certificates from the California Commission on Peace Officer

Standards in Training (POST), including advanced and administration certificates in leading tactical teams and missions. Craig has a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice Management.

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SCC Engineering Student Attends NASA Community College Aerospace Scholars Program

Engineering instructor Melanie Lutz is happy to report that Omar Shishani, an engineering student at Solano Community College, recently attended the NASA Community College Aerospace Scholars Program (NCAS) at the Marshall Space Flight Center, in Huntsville, Alabama during the week of September 23-27, 2019. Omar was selected from applicants from across the U.S. to be part of the NCAS onsite experience, in which students interact with NASA engineers and officials as they learn about careers in science and engineering. For their final project, students formed teams and established fictional companies interested in Mars exploration. Each team was responsible for developing and testing a prototype rover, building a company infrastructure,

managing a budget, and developing communications and outreach.

Omar reports that "I was not expecting to have such a rich experience at my trip to the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center. The part of the experience that stood out the most to me was the dynamics of our teamwork. It was a great experience working together with nine other people who I had just met. It was very difficult and extremely frustrating at times for us to work together - and to work efficiently - especially in the beginning. My experience at NCAS showed me how important it is to have leadership that was able to coordinate efforts in a practical way. Without proper management, a team will end up wasting a lot of time debating unimportant decisions, instead of focusing on their individual duties, and specializing on their individual tasks in the most productive way."

"The speakers at NCAS were very inspiring, and there were many more speakers than I had expected. Every day we got to hear stories from NASA employees. They told us about their career paths and goals, and they opened many new ideas about science and technology to me. It was satisfying to have completed our goal as a team at the end of each NCAS rover competition. There were a few times, especially in the middle of the second competition, where I was sure that we had no chance of completing our rover in time. In spite of my worries, we were able to pull through, and achieve awesome results with our models. I will remember my trip to Alabama forever. It was an experience that showed me great truths about what can be accomplished and learned when working in a team to achieve a great goal."

Omar hopes to transfer to UC Davis with a major in Civil Engineering, in Fall 2021.
