10. Welding

Rationale for proposals a:

David Lake fully explained this course at Tech Review but was unable to attend today. Jose Cortes presented this item.

This course was previously taught and is being modified/updated at this time. We will update certificates in the Fall. Course gives students experience working with a variety of metals to help them become well-rounded in the trade.

Saki voiced concern that Committee seems to be inconsistent when considering stand-alone courses. Jose and Joe spoke to the point that stand alone courses in CTE are not out of the ordinary. Skill building does not need to be part of a program.

Maire noted class size of 8. We are currently limited in materials/stations, but class has potential for 24. Committee increased the class size from 8 to 24 to avoid needing to modify the course in the future. Course will be cross-listed. Labs to be combined. Lecture for each class should run at separate times. We are in the process of hiring a FT WELD instructor.

11. Journalism

Rationale for proposals a-b:

Isabel Anderson was present to discuss these courses.

Modifications and new course are part of revamping the Journalism department and bringing back an SCC paper (SCC Pulse). Students in this major will work on the SCC Pulse for 4 semesters. Students must be enrolled in one of these courses to be involved in the paper.

Hours decreased to 2 hrs lecture with 3 hrs lab (instead of 2hrs lecture and 4hs lab).

Laura Maghoney - JOUR060 & 061 need a DE Addendum. Spell out abbreviations in Course Content. Elaborate and build course description and content to differentiate courses from each other.

Updates were made so that courses are prerequisites (they follow the series 1-4).

Courses are intended to be cross-listed. More advance skills have been added each course in the progression. Maire cautioned that courses are very similar, running at same time in the same room, and they need to be differentiated. Isabel will make sure these are different enough so repeatability is not in question. With each course, there is an increased level of responsibility in the newsroom. Advanced students help guide incoming students and take leadership roles. In Spring, advance students can run lecture sessions. The SCC Pulse is student-run, student-led, in most newsrooms the students are mentoring the next group of students. Faculty would step back in 3 & 4. There was some discussion about units and making these courses purely lab.

Ashlie shared that in the CCC system it is very common to have 4 JOUR courses and, among the colleges, there is a wide variety of how courses have been set up.

Alison suggested it may help to broaden scope by somehow weaving in a web development course. The new course does include multi-media platforms.

Saki asked how courses fit in the JOUR program? Only the 060 and 061 are required for JOUR certificate. The last two classes are not in the ADT/certificates and do not have a C-ID. These skill builder courses are for students who are already working in the field and need to build experience. Skill building courses are ok in CTE.

12. Nursing

Rationale for proposals a-e:

Maire Morinec explained that many of these modifications/changes resulted from a Board of Registered Nursing (BRN) review in November 2023.

Clinical experience placements (especially in pediatric nursing) are hard to secure. NURS has revised the number of clinical lab experience hours that are required, reducing the need for some clinical placements and adjuncts. All course modifications meet the BRN standards for direct patient care.

071A Foundations of Nursing is now a 16wk course instead of an 8wk course. This allows students to get feedback at mid-way point and can lead to increased student success.

071D Nursing Dosage Calculation is a new course and a co-requisite with 071A. Course includes math and will improve students' medication administration skills.

Per BRN, we are required to have content experts in Med/Surg, Psych, and Pediatrics.

Students will have an instructor for the entire semester. Specialty courses are will not be team taught.

Program changes have been made, and if approved today, they will be active Fall 2026.

Need to offer old and new course at the same time while transitioning to new program configuration.

NURS052 Pharmacology for Nursing is being dropped as a prerequisite for the program, but it is still being offered online for Allied health students. Content will be built into the courses it is most aligned with.

NURS111 – Maire is working with Ashlie to potentially make course CSU transferable.

Under the Brown Act, the public is entitled to comment on any matter within the subject matter jurisdiction of the legislative body, as well as any agenda item. Cal. Gov't Code § 54954.3(a). See Galbiso v. Orosi Pub. Util. Dist., 167 Cal. App. 4th 1063, 1080, 84 Cal. Rptr. 3d 788 (2008). Under the Brown Act, the legislative body does not have to listen to comments on items that are not within its subject matter jurisdiction. 78 Ops. Cal. Att'y Gen. 224 (1995). And, as under the Bagley-Keene Act, a legislative body under the Brown Act does not have to listen to comments on items that were already considered in a public meeting where there was an opportunity to comment. Cal. Gov't Code § 54954.3(a).

An agency may limit public comment on items described in the agenda to the time when those items are being considered. Olson v. Hornbrook Cmty. Servs. Dist., 33 Cal. App. 5th 502, 528, 245 Cal. Rptr. 3d 236 (March 26, 2019).

In addition, under both Acts, the body may adopt reasonable regulations to ensure that the above provisions are carried out, including but not limited to regulations limiting the total amount of time allocated to each individual speaker for public testimony or comment on particular issues. Cal. Gov't Code §§ 11125.7(b) (Bagley-Keene Act); 54954.3(b) (Brown Act). A legislative body of a local agency may regulate the time, place and manner for speech to ensure orderly discussion. Baca v. Moreno Valley Unified Sch. Dist., 936 F. Supp. 719 (C.D. Cal. 1996) (Brown Act); see, e.g., Ribakoff v. City of Long Beach, 27 Cal. App. 5th 150, 177, 238 Cal. Rptr. 3d 81 (2018) (rejecting plaintiff's First Amendment facial and as applied challenge to board's rule limiting public comment to three minutes); Olson, 33 Cal. App. 5th at 528 (holding limitation on public comment on agenda items to when those items are being considered was not an unreasonable regulation).

^{**}Under the Bagley-Keene Act, a body does not have to listen to comments on matters that are not on the agenda or that were already considered in a public meeting where there was an opportunity to comment. Cal. Gov't Code § 11125.7(a).
