FORD TRAINING EQUIPMENT DONATION AGREEMENT

This EQUIPMENT Donation Agreement ("Agreement"), entered into this 07/30/2024, is by and between Ford Motor Company ("FORD"), whose address is 1555 Fairlane Drive, Allen Park, Michigan 48101, and Solano Community College ("SCHOOL") whose address is

1695 Ascot Pkwy, Vallejo CA 94591

RECITALS

- A. FORD is willing to donate to SCHOOL certain EQUIPMENT as defined below, in support of SCHOOL's automotive training in the FORD Automotive Career Exploration (ACE) Program.
- B. SCHOOL is willing to receive the EQUIPMENT and use it for the purpose and in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for the good and valuable consideration, the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

TERMS & CONDITIONS

1. "EQUIPMENT" shall mean complete vehicles, production sub-assemblies of vehicles (for example, but not specifically engines, transmissions, etc.), or other production items to support an automotive training program (for example, but not specifically VCMs, tools specific to FORD vehicles, etc.) as identified below:

2. Donation.

(a) FORD hereby donates the EQUIPMENT specified above to SCHOOL, to be held and used by SCHOOL or its designees in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement:

- (b) All intellectual property including any trademarks and tradenames owned by FORD, including but not limited to intellectual property, trademarks and tradenames incorporated in or on the EQUIPMENT ("INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY") are, and will remain the exclusive property of FORD. SCHOOL shall not take any action that jeopardizes the INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, and shall acquire no licenses or any other rights in the INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY. SCHOOL acknowledges and agrees that nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to be an assignment of any rights in any of Ford INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, and that it will not assign, sublicense, transfer, or otherwise convey its rights or obligations under this Agreement.
- (c) ALL EQUIPMENT IS USED. SCHOOL AGREES THAT THE EQUIPMENT IS BEING DONATED IN "AS IS" CONDITION AND FORD DISCLAIMS ANY AND ALL EXPRESS AND IMPLIED WARRANTIES.
- 3. <u>Location; Risk of Loss.</u> Upon execution of this Agreement and upon delivery of the EQUIPMENT to SCHOOL, the EQUIPMENT shall become the property of SCHOOL, and SCHOOL shall bear the risk of loss of and damage to the EQUIPMENT and/or any personal injury (including death) or property damage caused by SCHOOL's use of the Training EQUIPMENT, in each case including loss or damage that occurs despite SCHOOL's or FORD's exercise of reasonable care.
- FORD expressly disclaims, and SCHOOL expressly releases FORD from any and all liability associated with the EQUIPMENT.
- 5. <u>Taxes, Fees and Other Permits.</u> SCHOOL shall pay all occupational taxes and governmental charges imposed in connection with the use and operation of the EQUIPMENT.
- 6. <u>Delivery.</u> FORD shall be responsible for delivery of the EQUIPMENT to SCHOOL [OR SCHOOL] shall pick up the EQUIPMENT at <u>NA</u>. FORD shall not be responsible for any delay in delivery or availability of the EQUIPMENT.

7. Use of EQUIPMENT.

- (a) SCHOOL may utilize the EQUIPMENT only for training programs. When the EQUIPMENT is no longer useful for training, SCHOOL shall properly dispose of the EQUIPMENT in such a manner as to ensure that the EQUIPMENT or any of its/their components can no longer be used or sold or have any value other than as scrap. The EQUIPMENT will be disposed of at SCHOOL's expense, including transportation to any scrap yard and any other associated fees. SCHOOL is entitled to collect and keep any funds received for the scrap value of the EQUIPMENT.
- (b) The EQUIPMENT may not be installed or used on vehicles operated on public roads. SCHOOL shall not use or operate the EQUIPMENT in violation of any federal, state, local, or provincial law, rule, regulation or ordinance. The EQUIPMENT shall be operated at all times in a safe, careful and lawful manner and by legally qualified operators. Under no circumstances shall any such operators be presumed to be the agent, servant or employee of FORD, nor shall any of them be deemed to be under FORD's exclusive direction and control.
- (c) In no event shall SCHOOL make the EQUIPMENT available to motor vehicle manufacturers or their agents, or motor vehicle suppliers or their agents, other than (i) SCHOOL's own authorized designees, or (ii) FORD and its designated agents.

- (d) UPON COMPLETION OF USE OF THE EQUIPMENT FOR THE FOREGOING PURPOSES, SCHOOL SHALL PROMPTLY SCRAP THE EQUIPMENT (FULL CRUSH). SCHOOL WILL NOT RE-USE, DONATE, SELL OR OTHERWISE DISPOSE OF THE EQUIPMENT OR ANY COMPONENTS FROM EQUIPMENT WITHOUT FORD'S PRIOR WRITTEN CONSENT, WHICH FORD MAY WITHHOLD IN ITS SOLE DISCRETION.
- 8. <u>Confidentiality and Publicity</u>. Except as required by law, SCHOOL shall not disclose or publicize to any third party: (i) any description of the EQUIPMENT, technical specifications or other information about the EQUIPMENT, (ii) the nature or terms of this Agreement, or (iii) the results of any testing, inspection or evaluation by SCHOOL without FORD's prior written consent. SCHOOL shall take the necessary steps to familiarize all appropriate employees and students of its obligations under this paragraph.
- 9. Force Majeure/Limitation of Liability.
 - (a) FORD shall not be liable for any failure in performing any provision hereof due to fire or other casualty, labor difficulty, governmental restriction or any cause beyond FORD's control.
 - (b) IN NO EVENT SHALL FORD BE LIABLE FOR ANY DAMAGE TO THE EQUIPMENTAND/OR ANY PERSONAL INJURY (INCLUDING DEATH) OR PROPERTY DAMAGE CAUSED BY SCHOOL'S USE OF THE TRAINING EQUIPMENT, OR FOR ANY LOSS OF PROFITS, OTHER CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OR INCONVENIENCE DUE TO ANY THEFT, DAMAGE, LOSS, DELAY OR FAILURE OF DELIVERY OR DEFECT OR FAILURE OF THE TRAINING EQUIPMENT OR THE TIME CONSUMED IN RECOVERING, REPAIRING, SERVICING OR REPLACING THE SAME.
- 10. <u>Dispute Resolution.</u> If either party initiates litigation on contractual causes arising from this Agreement, the other party shall have the right to initiate mediation with the Model Procedure for Mediation of Business Disputes of the Center for Public Resources ("CPR"). Each party will bear equally the costs of the mediation.
 - (a) The parties will jointly appoint a mutually acceptable mediator, seeking assistance in such regard from CPR if they have been unable to agree upon such appointment within twenty (20) calendar days.
 - (b) The parties agree to participate in good faith in the mediation and negotiations related thereto for a period of thirty (30) calendar days.
 - (c) If the mediation is not successful, either party may initiate litigation. This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan, without regard to its conflicts of laws provisions.

11. Miscellaneous.

(a) This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and may only be amended, modified or supplemented by a written amendment executed by FORD and SCHOOL. In no event shall any course of dealing, custom or usage of trade modify, alter or supplement any of the terms or provisions contained herein.

- (b) Failure by FORD to enforce any term, provision or condition hereof, or to exercise any of its rights hereunder, shall not be construed as thereafter waiving any such terms, provisions, conditions or rights.
- (c) All notices specified or permitted herein shall be in writing, shall be given by postpaid U.S. mail, and shall be deemed given when mailed in a post box regularly maintained by the U.S. Postal Service sent to the address of the party listed above.
- (d) Electronic Signature. A faxed signature or other electronically transmitted signature (i.e. via a .pdf file) on this Agreement will have the same legal force and effect as though it were the original of such signature

By its signature below, SCHOOL represents that such person is the duly authorized representative of SCHOOL and SCHOOL hereby accepts and acknowledges receipt of the EQUIPMENT listed above and has read, understands, and is in agreement with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

SCC Mission Statement:

Juwan Vartanian, as an immigrant, student and long term employee has both embodied and carried out the mission of our college. Drawing on her own experience she was able to meet the needs of our diverse student body where they are at in their educational journey and uplift them to achieve goals they themselves may not yet see.

Juwan has spent over 30 years working directly with our students in the field of early childhood education (ECE) as an Early Learning Specialist. In the academic year 2022/23 ECE had the highest awarded certificate in the entire college. These students are over 90% female and over 2/3 are people of color. Ms. Vartanian is directly responsible for lifting these women up by being a model of high quality professionalism as they navigate their educational goals.

In the role of Early Education Specialist Ms. Vartanian not only reached students but also the children and families of SCC. The majority of these families are adult students attending our college and over 90% of them receive subsidized assistance to both attend school and have their children cared for on campus. Research shows that students are 3 times as likely to complete their educational goals, on time, if utilizing care for their children on campus.

2. To what extent has the individual/organization/company remained engaged with the College?

Ms. Varianian has remained connected both directly and indirectly to the college. In 2024, with the completion of the new Toddler building infrastructure and adjoining outdoor play space, Ms. Varianian has returned as a consultant in designing the use of this space. Her long years of expertise in environmental design will ensure that future learners, both adults and children, will have the opportunity to succeed.

Another very telling way that Ms. Vartanian has remained connected to the college is through her legacy of impacting dedicated professionals. Of the 6 Early Learning Specialists employed by Solano Community College, half were her direct mentees when both taking their student teaching and as student workers. Each has gone on with success in the field of Early Childhood Education and then returned to give back to the college where they got their start to do the same work they saw their own mentor contribute to.

3. To what extent will recognizing the individual/organization/company inspire others to support the College?

It is valuable here to note that not only does the ELC prepare our future teachers, but they also serve our nursing students during their pediatric rotations. Ms. Vartanian herself was invited to support the creation of high quality spaces for children in school across the Bay Area. By recognizing our most tenured Early Learning Specialist the college demonstrates its commitment to this work and a commitment to quality. Through this demonstration we hope that both the CA Department of Education and our Local Solano Office of Education continue to support our efforts in workforce development.

4. To what extent will recognizing the individual/organization/company add value to the College?

Juwan Vartanian's classroom has been documented in publications by WestEd, the CA Department of Education, popular college textbooks and other publications. In 2022 a colleague of mine, Senta Green, was doing trainings in a number of provinces in China. Even then the videos and vignettes were taken from Solano Community College's Early Learning Center. By accepting this nomination SCC recognized the long commitment to quality provided by Juwan Vartanian.

Good evening president superintendent and board members, my name is Sabrina Drake and I am the interim Director of the ELC and it is my pleasure to share a bit about Juwan Vartanian who is retiring from SCC after an incredible 30-year career. Doyleen, the Director of the Children's programs in 1992 saw potential in an ECE student and recruited her to start working with Infants and Toddlers at SCC. At the time, Juwan was working for Vallejo Unified School District with preschoolers and was reluctant to work with the younger age group, but Doyleen persevered. Lucky us.

Juwan fell in love with working with infants and toddlers and invested her time and energy into providing the most idyllic environment and individual care for those children to be in while away from their families. Word of her skill with creating magical environments and activity invitations that were aesthetically appealing and engaging spread widely. Janet Gonzalez-Mena an ECE instructor at Napa Valley College used photos of Juwan's environment and her primary care routine in her newest textbook on caring for infants and toddlers and would continue to visit Juwan's space for subsequent editions. Faculty at Consumnes River College took photos of Juwan's invitations for their book "Loose Parts'. Juwan was a huge advocate for reusing found materials many of which she would pick up at local thrift stores. We have had many guests come to visit Juwan's natural environment as inspiration for their own classrooms in addition to an annual tour during the ECE Conference.

Juwan attended West Ed (Program for Infant Toddler Care) and became more of a regional expert. So much so, that PITC itself use photos and videos for their training materials. I recall attending a northern California meeting as a CDTC Coordinator shortly after Tony Ayala was hired. He was at the same meeting as the Mentor Coordinator, and I was very excited to share with him that the videos that they were showing to the audience were of Juwan's yard and classroom!

Most recently again Tony Ayala told me that Senta Greene a trainer for PITC on Culture, Family and Providers went to China to train caregivers and some of the videos used were of Juwan's; she is truly a worldwide phenomenon!

She became a Mentor Teacher through the Mentor Program and shared her expertise and mentoring with hundreds of fellow teachers in our community and as a Specialist with the ELC she trained hundreds of practicum students who went into the workforce as aptly prepared infant toddler caregivers.

Juwan wanted every child to have a special experience while in our program. She worked hard to mentor new staff and advocate for changes in the program to improve. She truly made the mundane a special moment. A diaper change was not just a diaper change; it was a bonding experience for a child and their caregiver. Songs and conversation and children participating in having their diaper changed.

Anytime we may have disagreed about how many staff she needed and why the budget would not support it or equipment that was beautiful and expensive I always knew that Juwan argued for what was best for children and that they truly deserved the absolute best. She has left a legacy here at the ELC that we will do our best to honor and uphold.

Any costs, expenses, damages or time extensions not included are deemed waived.

HPITSP/GTSA AGREEMENT

This HPITSP/GTSA Agreement ("<u>Agreement</u>"), effective as of <u>October 16, 2024</u> (the "<u>Effective Date</u>"), is by and between <u>Solano Community College</u> ("<u>School</u>"), and Hyundai Motor America, a California corporation ("<u>HMA</u>"). Intending to be legally bound, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. **DEFINITIONS**

As used herein, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

- 1.1. **Learning Management System ("<u>LMS</u>")** Refers collectively to HPI-Techs.com and GenesisTechAcademy.com, the sites where Instructors and Students' training access and progress is stored.
- 1.2. **LMS ID Creation Process Documentation ("<u>Process Document</u>")** A document created by HMA that provides instructions for creation of an LMS account, user management for Instructors, and Project expectations and benefits.
- 1.3. **Project** Refers collectively to the Hyundai Performance Institute Technician Student Program (HPITSP) and Genesis Technician Student Academy (GTSA), as further described in Section 2.1 below.
- 1.4. **Student** An individual currently enrolled as a student in School and who will participate in the Project.

2. PROJECT AND PROJECT OBJECTIVES

- 2.1. Project. The LMS was created in effort to improve the exposure of the Hyundai and Genesis brands to prospective technicians and create a foundational relationship with schools offering automotive requisites and/or electives. Through offering technical training courses to Students, HMA aims to enhance the learning experience of automotive Students to be successful within their career. This is part of a series of HMA and Genesis Motor America ("GMA"), a division of HMA, initiatives meant to create a pathway to increased support and investment into the future of the automotive technician career.
- 2.2. Project Objectives. The objectives for this Project are as follows:
 - 2.2.1. To increase the Hyundai and Genesis certification statuses of candidates prior to seeking employment within the Hyundai and Genesis brands;
 - 2.2.2. To remain competitive through brand and training immersion so Students can make an educated decision on which automotive original equipment manufacturer ("OEM") they will pursue a career with; and
 - 2.2.3. Identify schools to increase overall efforts for recruitment, asset donation, and related support projects.

3. ACCESS AND USE OF THE LMS

- 3.1. HMA agrees to provide School with access to its proprietary LMS subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 3.2. School shall have the non-exclusive, non-transferable right to access and use the LMS during the term of this Agreement for educational purposes only in accordance with this Agreement.
- 3.3. Students must be enrolled in and attend School to be eligible to utilize the LMS.
- 3.4. Students must use an accessible email address to create an account within the LMS as described in the Process Document to be provided by HMA to School.
- 3.5. Instructors are enrolled using their email addresses. One Instructor (or School-designated staff member) will be enrolled as an Admin for both LMS sites, or the School may elect to delegate separate Admins for each LMS site. Instructors will have access to the entire course catalogue upon initial LMS login after account creation is completed, as described in the Process Document.
- 3.6. Neither School nor Students will have access to OEM technical repair resources through the LMS. Any access to technical repair resources will require additional terms and conditions not associated with this Agreement.
- 3.7. School shall not, without the prior written consent of HMA, (a) modify, adapt, translate, or create derivative works based on the LMS; (b) reverse engineer, decompile, disassemble, or otherwise attempt to derive the source code; (c) distribute, sublicense, lease, lend, rent, or otherwise make the LMS available to third parties; (d) remove, alter, or obscure any proprietary notices or markings on the LMS.

4. CERTIFICATION PATHS

- 4.1. "Certification Path" refers to the courses assigned to Students to obtain "certified express" and "certified service tech" certification statuses within the Hyundai and/or Genesis brands.
- 4.2. Students are assigned the Certification Path of "Service Technician" on the LMS they request access to. Students will only be given access to one LMS site (a) until the assigned Certification Path is completed or (b) upon the Student's request for access to the other LMS site and completion of at least ten (10) hours of training on the initially assigned LMS site. Students will gain access to the remainder of the technical training courses available in the catalogue upon completion of the assigned Certification Path courses. Students are encouraged to retain a copy of their course transcripts on the LMS at the conclusion of usage for their records.
- 4.3. Currently, and subject to change as HMA's and GMA's vision and requirements adapt to the evolving trade, the Service Technician Certification Path requirements are as follows:
 - 4.3.1. Hyundai 46 web-based courses and 1 virtual instructor led training ("VILT")*.
 - 4.3.2. Genesis 54 web-based courses and 1 VILT*.

- * The VILT is currently unavailable on the LMS and can only be completed upon employment at a Hyundai or Genesis dealership.
- 4.4. School recognizes that participation in the Project is voluntary and there is no guarantee of employment by HMA, GMA, or any Hyundai or Genesis dealership upon completion of any Certification Path.

5. Instructors

- 5.1. "Instructor" refers to a teacher or other administrative staff at School who helps facilitate the Project at their School.
- 5.2. Instructors must be employed by School. School shall notify HMA when an Instructor is no longer employed within the School and provide updated contact information for new Instructors.
- 5.3. Instructors are responsible for overseeing Agreement renewal and should request an updated Agreement no less than thirty (30) days prior to Agreement expiration to help prevent a lapse in LMS course availability for its Students.
- 5.4. Instructors are responsible for providing the Process Document to Students.
- 5.5. Within thirty (30) days of a Student's non-enrollment in School, Instructors will deactivate such Student user in the LMS (such as for a Student who has graduated).

6. TERM

This Agreement commences on the Effective Date and will continue, unless earlier terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, until July 1, 2026 ("<u>Term</u>"). This Agreement may be terminated by either party at any time upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party. HMA may immediately terminate this Agreement at any time for cause in the event of a breach of this Agreement by School.

7. TERMS OF USE

School acknowledges that it has read and will comply with the LMS Terms of Use, a copy of which is attached hereto as Attachment #1 and incorporated herein by reference.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY

School shall use that care which it uses to protect its confidential information but not less than a reasonable degree of care to protect any information or data disclosed to School by HMA, or on behalf of HMA, in connection with the Project ("Confidential Information"). Such confidentiality obligation shall be observed during the Term and for a period of five years following the termination or expiration of this Agreement. Except as specifically authorized in this Agreement, School shall not use, sell, publish or otherwise disclose to any third party any Confidential Information without the prior written consent of HMA.

9. NOTICES

Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication either party desires or is required to give to the other party or any other person must be in writing and either served personally or sent by pre-paid, first-class mail or overnight delivery to the address set forth below. Either party may change its address by notifying the other party of the change of address in writing.

Notice will be deemed communicated upon receipt or in four (4) days from the date-stamped time of mailing if mailed as provided in this Section, whichever first occurs. Alternatively, either party may electronically transfer notices, provided that no electronic communication will be deemed communicated until telephonic confirmation of receipt by the individual addressee is received.

The contractor further declares under penalty of perjury that they adhere to the Sweatfree Code of Conduct as set forth on the California Department of Industrial Relations website located at www.dir.ca.gov, and Public Contract Code Section 6108.
- b. The contractor agrees to cooperate fully in providing reasonable access to the contractor's records, documents, agents or employees, or premises if reasonably

required by authorized officials of the contracting agency, the Department of Industrial Relations, or the Department of Justice to determine the contractor's compliance with the requirements under paragraph (a).

- 7. DOMESTIC PARTNERS: For contracts of \$100,000 or more, Contractor certifies that Contractor is in compliance with Public Contract Code section 10295.3.
- 8. GENDER IDENTITY: For contracts of \$100,000 or more, Contractor certifies that Contractor is in compliance with Public Contract Code section 10295.35.

2. LABOR CODE/WORKERS' COMPENSATION: Contractor needs to be aware of the provisions which require every employer to be insured against liability for Worker's _64-Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions, and

Contractor affirms to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Agreement. (Labor Code Section 3700)

- 3. AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT: Contractor assures the State that it complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to the ADA. (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.)
- 4. CONTRACTOR NAME CHANGE: An amendment is required to change the Contractor's name as listed on this Agreement. Upon receipt of legal documentation of the name change the State will process the amendment. Payment of invoices presented with a new name cannot be paid prior to approval of said amendment.
- 5. CORPORATE QUALIFICATIONS TO DO BUSINESS IN CALIFORNIA:
- a. When agreements are to be performed in the state by corporations, the contracting agencies will be verifying that the contractor is currently qualified to do business in California in order to ensure that all obligations due to the state are fulfilled.
